Dear Parents,

Well, another year is nearly over and we have made it to the end of term. The start of 2021 began with just over two months of remote learning and plenty of unknowns and as we head into the Christmas break, in some ways nothing much has changed. Whilst numbers of cases of Covid in the school are still relatively small, the huge number reported nationally this week is leading to much speculation as to what January 2022 will be like. We will continue to take a measured approach to whatever situation arises, responding to government directives (of which you may recall there were several during the Christmas holidays last year), and we will plan to keep things as normal as possible for our school community, but without taking unnecessary risks.

Linked to that, all schools have been asked to conduct lateral flow testing programmes on site when students return in the new year, which we will do on the Tuesday and Wednesday with Years 7 to 11. As FE Colleges are not required to operate a testing programme, we have decided that, in order to get through testing in two days, we will not test sixth form students. This programme should not be seen as a substitute for the regular twice-weekly testing that should have been happening throughout the year; more, a confirmation that all students who come into school are safe to be here. As an addition to the DfE submission that we all have to do once we have taken an LFT, we are asking that you submit the result of your child's last test of the holidays on a very simple electronic form that will be sent just before our return. This will simply provide us with additional reassurance; it will take a matter of seconds to complete, but we would be grateful for everyone's cooperation in doing this. Thank you.

The wearing of masks is certainly set to be with us for some time yet and after their reintroduction in communal areas in November, we have quietly issued students who have forgotten theirs with disposable ones. Our numbers of masks are now looking quite depleted, so please can you ensure that your children bring their own each day. The vast majority of students have been exceptional in terms of having them and wearing them appropriately, but from January, we will be adding in a Level 1 demerit for those who forget, to hopefully bring the compliance rate up to 100%. Students who are exempt should ensure they have the appropriate card to show when asked and should see their tutor if they don't have one.

But there are other things that are nothing to do with Covid and I am delighted to be able to write about those too:

School Trips

I have been pleased to see the gradual increase of clubs and activities taking place since the start of the year. In normal times they totalled 60 and this term has seen roughly half that number happening; in Terms 3 and 4, the figure will amount to over 40, so we are heading in the right direction. A few weeks ago, 40 Year 8 students had an amazing time at Bletchley Park enjoying code-breaking, developing newfound skills to identify John Cairncross as a Soviet spy and watching some coding on an original Enigma machine. Comparing the reality with the Hollywood film, *The Imitation Game*, was also very interesting for those who went. Fingers are firmly being crossed for the current Year 7 that they will be able to have the same opportunity in a year's time.
