Spotlight on Careers

Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) is aimed at providing pupils and parents with occupational guidance and vocational advice, helping pupils to think about what they want to do with their lives and about the sort of people they wish to become. We believe that

co-ordinated provision is central to developing these aims with curriculum subject areas, tutors and external agencies where appropriate make significant contributions. I am the school independent careers advisor who is available to pupils in Years 7 – 13. I provide guidance interviews for pupils and participate in specific lessons in the Year 11 Careers Education programme. As the Careers Advisor I also attend relevant Parents' Evenings and am available to discuss relevant issues with parents and their children. There is an overview of the careers programme available for parents, employers, members of staff and other stakeholders available by clicking on the Careers Overview tab on the school website.

A reminder that there is a Careers "Drop-in" on Thursday and Friday lunch times, where no appointment is necessary! Just come along to the Careers Hub for help.

A recent highlight so far this year has been National Apprenticeship Week (6 - 12 Feb) and National Careers Week (6 - 12 March) where we welcomed lots of employers and training providers into school during lunch times where they operated "pop-up" stands in a central area where students could stop and talk to them and find out more about training opportunities and careers within that job sector.

The feedback from our visitors was lovely and they really enjoyed their time coming into Sheldon and interacting with our students.

Giving the students first hand experience of interacting with employers is really vital in helping them to understand their options, as well as prepare themselves for future next steps post 16 or 18.

It was lovely to see so many students taking the time to stop and chat with them and ask lots of interesting questions about what opportunities they could offer them in the future.

Flying Start Challenge

Two teams of four budding engineers from Sheldon qualified for the Flying Start Challenge, Regional Finals on Monday 20th March. There was much excitement, and some trepidation as the teams took their gliders to compete against entries from 24 other schools at Aerospace Bristol. The event required students to launch their prototype gliders in the hall containing Concord (!); present and discuss their designs; construct a free-standing structure that could withstand an earthquake; and parachute an object safely to earth. The students performed brilliantly - Team Balsa Dart (Abraham Jones,



Rob Patient, Ben Goldsmith and, in absentia, Nia McIver) flew over 12m and built the tallest, most stable structure, while The Plummeters had first place for their flight and came second place overall (only 2 points behind the winners.)
