ICE CityZen Civil Engineering Award





Year 12 Product Design students have all completed the Institute for Civil Engineering (ICE) CityZen Award after producing well-researched group work looking at improving the facilities and infrastructure of Chippenham town centre.

Working with an industrial mentor from September to December, students developed their understanding of civil engineering completing a series of scenarios using the CityZen platform. After working together to solve problems including sustainable housing, bridge development, improving leisure facilities and preparing for natural disasters, students turned their attention to exploring and tackling problems in the local area.

The two teams from Sheldon (pictured above) worked incredibly hard to research, design and present their ideas with both teams receiving very positive feedback from the ICE and their mentor. It was fantastic to see them grow in confidence throughout the project, gain an insight into new potential careers and work alongside industry specialists. I am proud of all of the students who were great ambassadors of Sheldon school and who I am sure all have the potential to be civil engineers of the future.

Ten Tors Challenge 2023

Last weekend 18 Sheldon students took part in the annual Army run Ten Tors Challenge on Dartmoor. Sheldon had three teams aiming to complete the 35 and 45 mile challenges. Having been training since October, this was the culmination of a lot of hard work, dedication, time, sweat, mud and tears, with the 18 toeing the start line having been whittled down from nearly 60 who began the training.

Having spent the week before prepping their kit and planning their assigned routes, students travelled to Okehampton Army Camp on Friday, spending the remaining day completing last minute route planning and the final checks of their kit. On Saturday, having been woken to the sound of Chariots of Fire at 5am, students were on the start line at 6.30am. After a brief

address from Colonel Professor Sir Van-Tam (of Covid briefing fame) the teams set off into the Dartmoor fog at 7am. As the day progressed the weather cleared and all three teams made excellent progress through Saturday! Sunday provided trickier conditions, with more widespread hill fog causing some navigation challenges for the teams. This, combined with tiredness and sore feet, led to a drop in pace. Nonetheless they all ploughed on making good time and completing without any dropouts. It was a delight to see the teams embrace the spirit of the event and, cross the finish line not only as a team, but in a variety of wonderful fancy dress - although I'm still not convinced by the Mr Page masks!

All three teams were a real credit to Sheldon School and a

pleasure to have worked with over the last months.
